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Veteran's Information

You May Not Know About

- Delaware veterans can get a veteran's ID for discounts at many local stores at the Division of Motor Vehicles (DMV). Go online or visit the DMV for more information. In Delaware, veterans can get a license plate that identifies them as a veteran.
- 2. If you are a Maryland resident you should visit the Maryland Vehicle Administration (MVA) in the county where you are located, or go online, for information on license plates and identification cards
- **3.** Delaware veterans can also be buried in veteran cemeteries in each county in Delaware. Call or email the local

- DE Veterans Affairs Office for more information. Maryland residents should visit the local MD Veterans Affairs Office for more information.
- For IDs, Delaware requires you to be a current resident of the State of Delaware and having DD-214 discharge papers. Other information may also be required by the Delaware Commission of Veterans Affairs.
- 5. Boscovs's department store will also give veterans a 15% discount on all purchases. You must go to customer service on the 2nd floor and show your veterans ID card. The discount is good for that day.



What is a Veteran?

Throughout my travels assisting veterans, I'm often asked, "What is a veteran?". Some agencies define veterans based on whether they were active duty, in the reserves, or served with the National Guard. Some definitions rely on how many days a person was activated for training or deployment. Then some definitions focus on character of discharge, such as Honorable, General, or Dishonorable.

I cannot provide an inclusive definition but I can share my personal definition of a veteran. It is derived from the greatest veteran I ever met, my father. You see, he served during the Korean War and his experiences shaped my veteran observations. He told me he was proud to defend our nation even if it meant giving his life. My father accepted his draft notice, not complaining about training at bases in the segregated south or about the long ship ride to Korea that left him sea sick daily. No complaints because he understood his purpose, to be a good soldier because our country required his service to defeat an enemy.

He told me of friendships, training, and positive experiences acquired from an Army at war. My father repaid those lessons by displaying our nation's colors in front of our home for all to see. This was rare because the U.S. flag was not a known entity in our lower social-economical urban neighborhoods. My father minded me that our nation made it possible for him, and subsquently me, to succeed.

Unfortunately my father, my lifeline, passed away recently but I'm lucky. I'm lucky because he witnessed my thirty years of service to our nation as an American Airman. I'm lucky because we were able to share stories of dual Korea assignments and of military changes. I'm lucky because his existence shaped my veteran definition.

So what is a veteran?

For me, a veteran is someone who willingly swore to defend our country, knowing it could mean their life. A veteran is someone who accepted military circumstances, good or bad, and utilized them to make themselves stronger. A veteran is someone who proudly recalls their time in service highlighting it through patriotic displays.

"True" veterans are rare jewels whose commitment to our nation was instrumental in maintaining our freedom. I ask that you acknowledge them because you'll never know when their presence will become extinct. With that being said, I want to thank my pop for being a veteran and for the many life lessons he taught me.
